SEPSIS: New Jersey Hospitals Rank Top 6 Nationally

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services updated their Hospital Compare website

(https://www.medicare.gov/hospitalcompare/search.html) with the newly released, publicly available hospitalspecific data for "percentage of patients who received appropriate care for severe sepsis and septic shock."

As a state, N.J. hospitals reported completing all the steps required in the sepsis bundle 56 percent of the time,

ranking in the top six states in the nation for this metric. The national average is 49 percent.

Sepsis is a complication that occurs when your body has an extreme response to an infection. It causes damage to organs in the body and can be life-threatening if not treated. If sepsis becomes severe enough or develops into septic shock, the chances of dying from sepsis increase significantly.

PATIENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT UPDATE


According to the recently conducted NJHIIN Patient and Family Engagement Survey, 73 percent of N.J. hospitals that responded to the survey indicated having instituted a patient and family advisory council (PFAC). This is an important component that NJHIIN continues to focus on.

To aid in increasing participation and provide guidance to hospitals on implanting a PFAC within their facility, NJHA will host an in-person, hands-on workshop Thurs., Oct. 4 on how to create and sustain a PFAC to improve patient safety, featuring experts from the American Institutes for Research, the Person and Family Engagement Contractor (PFEC) for Partnership for Patients.

This workshop will walk participants through the three steps of building a PFAC: assessing readiness and building the foundation; recruiting and selecting advisors; and, building the infrastructure to sustain the PFAC. It also will provide examples of projects that PFACs have worked on to improve the quality and safety of care.
