OVERVIEW:

Care-providing facilities, including acute care hospitals, nursing homes and home care agencies, are required, as a condition of accreditation by The Joint Commission, to have a standing mechanism to address ethical issues that arise in the healthcare setting. Most organizations meet this requirement with an interdisciplinary ethics committee.

The Healthcare Ethics Committee Symposium is designed to address the vital role of healthcare ethics committees and their unique responsibilities, including education, clinical ethics consultation and policy development and review. Using case studies, published materials, institutional policies, and personal experiences, the faculty and attendees will explore issues that typically require ethical analysis and resolution. These issues include informed consent and refusal, decisional capacity and decision making by and for patients, truth telling and confidentiality, care at the beginning and end of life, justice and access to healthcare services and organizational ethics.

Ethics committees come in all shapes, sizes, and stages of development; their members bring varying skill sets, knowledge bases, and levels of experience. Because the program's central focus will be skills and strategies to enhance healthcare ethics committees as an organizational resource, this intensive two-day symposium is essential for anyone who chairs, serves on, or supports healthcare ethics committees.

Given the tight agenda, the assigned sections of these materials should be read in preparation for Days 1 and 2 of the symposium.

OBJECTIVES:

At the end of Day 1 of this symposium:

- 1. Explains the role of healthcare ethics committees and distinguish it from the roles of other organizational resources
- 2. Identifies ethical issues that commonly arise in the healthcare setting and how they are most effectively addressed by ethics committees
- 3. Clarifies the often competing interests, principles and obligations that create ethical dilemmas in the healthcare setting
- 4. Identifies the ethical issues related to decision making, truth telling, confidentiality, disclosure, privacy, decision making for special populations, and care at the end of life.

At the end of Day 2 of this symposium:

- 1. Identifies the competing ethical principles and obligations that create thorny ethical issues
- 2. Discusses the moral agency of organizations
- 3. Contrasts the several models of clinical ethics consultation services
- 4. Lists the types of issues that would be appropriate for clinical ethics consultation
- 5. Describes a clinical ethics consultation from case presentation to resolution, including analysis and documentation.

TARGET AUDIENCE:

Healthcare ethics committee chairs and members, including but not limited to physicians, nurses, in-house counsel, social workers, risk managers, clergy, case managers, quality improvement directors, compliance officers, other healthcare professionals, and community members.

FACULTY:

Linda Farber Post, JD, MA, BSN, is director, Bioethics at Hackensack University Medical Center (HackensackUMC), clinical associate professor in the Department of Medicine at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School, and associate professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine at St. George's University School of Medicine. She is an experienced bioethicist, clinical ethics consultant, educator, author and speaker. She received her bachelor's degree in nursing from Skidmore College, her master's degree in psychiatric nursing and education from New York University, and her juris doctorate from the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law.

As director, Bioethics at Hackensack University Medical Center since 2007, Ms. Post provides an in-house resource to assist in the identification, assessment and resolution of ethical issues that arise in the medical center. In her capacities as clinical associate professor and associate professor, Ms. Post develops and implements bioethics teaching programs for residents and medical students, the goal of which is to make ethics an integral part of physician education and clinical practice. With Jeffrey Blustein, she co-authored *Handbook for Health Care Ethics Committees*, 2nd edition (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2015)

Dr. Jeanne Kerwin, D.MH, CT, manager of Bioethics and Palliative Care at Atlantic Health System, Morristown. She is responsible for the building of palliative care services throughout the five hospital system and assuring that each site has a functioning bioethics committee and trained consultants to provide consultations to patients, families/surrogates and medical staff when ethical dilemmas arise during the care of patients. She has over 20 years of experience providing bioethics consultations and is co-founder of the Palliative Care Program at Overlook Medical Center. She currently sits on the Life Time Support Ethics Committee, which serves the developmental disability population in Union County. She serves as the co-chair of the Overlook Medical Center Bioethics Committee and is a consultant to the Medical Society of NJ's Bioethics Committee.

Dr. Kerwin is a faculty member for Drew University's graduate program in Medical Humanities, has a Certificate in Bioethics and Medical Humanities from Columbia University and is a Faculty Scholar in the Palliative Care Education & Practice program from Harvard Medical School.
