Overview

This symposium will focus on educating health care providers, nurses, medical staff and administrators about pediatric sepsis, its management, and evidence-based practices that decrease morbidity and mortality in children with sepsis. The symposium will feature nationally recognized pediatric sepsis experts from the Children's Hospital Association's IPSO (Improving Pediatric Sepsis Outcomes) collaborative, as well as the Sepsis Alliance. An optional workshop will also be provided for medical professionals interested in implementing a pediatric sepsis bundle in their home institutions.

Objectives

- › Understand the power of team and role of data in driving change
- › Understand how leaders can inspire change through articulation of a clear vision
- › Identify the importance of systematic screening to enhance sepsis recognition
- › Understand how to benefit from multidisciplinary collaboration and national programs to improve local outcomes
- › Understand the difficulties with diagnosis of pediatric sepsis and its impact on families
- › Learn how to strategize, create and implement pediatric sepsis bundles applicable to one's patient population

Learner Outcome

After successfully completing the course, the learner will be able to understand the importance of leadership, vision and collaboration when implementing a large-scale sepsis bundle in a health care setting. Identify abnormal vital signs that are concerning for sepsis in children and list evidence-based interventions to decrease morbidity and mortality

**Successful completion of the course is defined as in-person attendance for 95 percent of the didactic learning session and a complete course evaluation.*

Guest Speakers

Marnie Doubek, MD, FAAFP

Dr. Doubek received her bachelor of arts from the University of Pennsylvania. She attended medical school at SUNY Health Science Center, Brooklyn. She completed her residency in family medicine at Overlook Hospital Family Medicine Residency Program, Summit, NJ, where she was chief resident in her third year. She is the mother of a sepsis survivor, and recognized the need to raise awareness and recognition of sepsis both in the medical community and in the general population. She is currently a member of the Advisory Board of the Sepsis Alliance and a successful family physician for over 17 years and a part of the Atlantic Medical Group.

Richard J. Brill, MD, FAAP, MCCM

Dr. Brill is chief medical officer and a pediatric intensivist at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, OH. He completed his pediatric residency and pediatric critical care fellowship at Cincinnati Children's Hospital. He is the recipient of numerous prestigious awards, one of which is the renowned John F. Wolfe Endowed Chair in Medical Leadership and Pediatric Quality and Safety. He has been a pioneer and leader in the pediatric quality and safety movement. He has more than 200 publications and is the current co-Editor-in-Chief of the first pediatric journal on children's safety and quality (*Pediatric Quality and Safety*). He is also co-chair of the Children's Hospital Association's Improving Pediatric Sepsis Outcomes (IPSO) collaborative.

Scott Weiss, MD

Dr. Weiss is a graduate of Cornell University and Harvard Medical School, and obtained a master's of science in clinical epidemiology from the University of Pennsylvania. After pediatrics training at Children's Hospital Boston (Harvard) and pediatric critical care fellowship at Lurie Children's Hospital (Northwestern), Dr. Weiss came to Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) in 2011 where he is currently an attending physician in the pediatric intensive care unit.

Dr. Weiss' research focuses on epidemiology of pediatric sepsis and mitochondrial dysfunction in sepsis-associated organ injury. He has several active studies evaluating risk factors, biomarkers, and mechanisms of organ dysfunction in pediatric sepsis, including changes in the intestinal microbiome. Dr. Weiss is involved with quality improvement work for sepsis at CHOP, including

developing a hospital-wide sepsis screening alert integrated within the electronic medical record. He also serves as the co-vice chair for the international Pediatric Surviving Sepsis Campaign.

Thomas Heymann, MBA

Thomas Heymann is the president and executive director of Sepsis Alliance, the largest sepsis advocacy organization in the United States working to save lives and reduce suffering from sepsis by raising awareness of sepsis as a medical emergency. Tom has been part of Sepsis Alliance since its inception in 2007 serving as a consultant and board member. He has led Sepsis Alliance to consecutive years of growth including the organizational drive to increase sepsis awareness from 19 percent to 58 percent and the expansion of sepsis.org to a site serving 2.5 million patients, family members, caregivers and medical professionals each year. He also serves as an advisory board member to the Canadian Sepsis Foundation.
