This education program will examine the American Association of Critical Care Nurses (AACN) Standards for Establishing and Sustaining Healthy Work Environments and the variables that go into supporting the model. The undertaking of improving hospital nursing work environments rests primarily with nurse leaders, aspiring nurse leaders and frontline staff, all of which support the work of the healthcare team and contribute to patient engagement.

Growing future nurse leaders is a long-term quest that requires both planning and action, as our emerging leaders will ultimately replace our current leaders and continue the very important work being done to improve nursing practice environments, and most importantly, patient outcomes. The leader role is influential in creating a professional environment and fostering a culture where interdisciplinary team members are able to contribute to optimal patient outcomes and grow professionally.
