According to the National Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (NPUAP), a pressure injury is localized damaged to the skin and underlying soft tissue, usually over a bony prominence or related to a medical or other device. It can present as intact skin or an open ulcer and may be painful. It occurs as a result of intense or prolonged pressure or pressure in combination with shear.

Although the terms "decubitus ulcer", "pressure sore" and "pressure ulcer" have often been used interchangeable, NPUAP currently considers "pressure injury" the best term to use, given that open ulceration does not always occur.

Did you know:

Number affected: 2.5 million patients per year

Cost: Pressure injuries cost \$9.1 to \$11.6 billion per year in the United States. Cost of individual patient care ranges from \$20,900 to \$151,700 per pressure injury. Medicare estimates in 2007 that each pressure injury added \$43,180 to a hospital stay.

Lawsuits: More than 17,000 lawsuits are related to pressure injuries annually. It is the second most common claim after wrongful death and more frequent than falls or emotional distress claims.

Pain: Pressure injuries may be associated with severe pain.

Death: About 60,000 patients die as a direct results of pressure injuries each year.
